### President's Briefing - Ashwin Mistry, Club President

We are now 6 months into our new arrangements with IDOL Group and as matters settle down, we are now realising the benefits of controlled monthly outgoings which indicate that we are turning a corner.

The refurbishment encourages different views, ranging from "love it" to "we've lost the Golf Club feel"... it is reassuring the vast majority of comments from both members and visitors tend to be positive!

It was disappointing to hear that the land deal had stalled and whilst we continue positive dialogue with Morrisons, the extreme dry continuous weather has challenged our plans for both water storage and Irrigation Projects to commence. We are not alone in this battle as most neighbouring courses have the same issues.

Over the next couple of months we will look at our finances for further controls but also to explore additional income generating opportunities.

The golfing season is well underway and I'm happy to report that society income is positive, however green fee income is stable despite hopes that we would see an upturn especially as we receive very favourable feedback from visitors.

Over the past few months a number of emerging themes are appearing, namely :-

- » Continued lack of use by members of the catering services. We track numbers and despite extending the menu, many members continue to avoid staying post-golf to support our new catering facilities. We cannot force members to support, but as we have said on countless occasions, "use it or lose it"
- » Secondly, which is more disturbing is the rise of Golf Course Members as opposed to Golf Club Members. I continuously get reminded that life has moved on as more and more members are both time and cash poor so changing behaviours have to be accepted. Every member of The Leicestershire Golf Club signs up to being members of a Golf Club. This entails an expected form of behaviour as this is a Members Club, not just a venue you attend for sporting gratification. It is OUR CLUB.
- » Trigger happy comments We get lots of comments, advice and suggestions often to suit the individual or the group they purport to represent. However, the follow up offer to either get involved or help is met with the same old comment ... "I'm just too busy "...

The numerous Committee & Sub-Committee members spend an incredible amount of time to keep the Club going. Without additional help, it falls on the same people to make our club function. The reports below highlight some additional challenges which are being met head on.

That's all for now and we will report on numbers, progress on Incorporation and income opportunities later in the summer.

### UPDATE FROM TLGC COMPETITON AND HANDICAP COMMITTEE

The C&H sub-committee at TLGC reports to the Membership committee and is responsible for handicaps and competitions (although some competition issues are managed by individual club section (i.e. ladies, juniors, seniors). The committee is aware of concerns expressed informally about very low scoring in Saturday competitions and thought it would be useful to provide a summary of measures that are taken to review this.

#### 1. Annual handicap review

This is carried out annually in November/December. The review is carried out by a sub-group of the committee and is informed by a series of standardised reports from the WHS platform. These include a statistical report on outlying scores, number of scores since last played to handicap and comparison of general play versus competition play scores for individual golfers. As a result of this, handicap alterations may be made for individual golfers.

#### 2. Monitoring of regular competition winners and handicap reductions

Handicap review should be an ongoing process and EG advice permits the committee to impose handicap reductions at any time based on both general play and competition scores. There is an informal process for monitoring frequent competition winners particularly of team competitions where scores are non-acceptable for handicap (e.g. AM/AM, Texas scramble). In the current golfing season, four players have had a total of six handicap reductions imposed as a result of these reviews. One player's handicap has come down by 11.1 since March 2025 because of individual scores, an exceptional scoring reduction applied routinely by WHS and additional reductions imposed by C&H.

In addition, scorecards are reviewed where exceptional scores are posted in team competitions. For example, the score of 52 Stableford points in a better ball format which won Club Day was in part due to double points (6 in total) scoring on hole 18 in alternative pin position and a run of three consecutive birdies by one of the winning pair. Some excellent golf!

#### 3. Manipulating handicap by submitting high general play scores.

There is lot of talk about this in golfing press and golf forums but how much this actually happens is difficult to know. In the past, we have certainly seen some evidence of suspicious scoring patterns in some visitors entering the Winter Series competitions organised by the pro and acted with these individuals. At the handicap review, we do review a report from the WHS platform which looks at average score differential and compares general play versus competition scores. In 2023, we identified one member where there appeared to be a significant difference but when we looked again at the end of 2024 this was no longer the case so may just have been a statistical quirk.

Finally, can we please remind members about two issues.

- » Once you sign in for a competition or a general play score you must return a score either through the PSI, EG app or if necessary, a physical card. In a medal, if you failed to complete a hole you should still make your best effort at the remaining holes and return a score as your score will still count for handicap. The hole you did not finish will count as a net double bogey.
- » Booking into competitions. If you are booked into a competition and then find you must withdraw due to an urgent issue, please inform your playing partners especially if this is at short notice. There have been several reports recently where players have withdrawn at short notice leaving other players without a marker or by themselves.

It means that low Hcps are no longer facing a game off ground zero against a zillion shots before they birdie the first par 5. 38 individuals have played in the matches so far. 14 games played and just 8 to go.

The exchange day, 7th July, open to all seniors and was again all about the golf. At Finham, Coventry Golf Club. Playing individual stableford in teams of three those under 18 Hcp were ranked by Hcp. Those with Hcps greater than 18 were randomly drawn into teams of three. 26 players submitted cards 4 did not. Mehbs Kantharia came in first with 41 points, closely followed by Tim Green on 39 and Saj Khan on 39 on countback.

The Lewis trophy is currently headed up by Arif Osman. Clubman of the year is led by Dave Sparrow.

The 9 Hole invitational on Monday 23rd June was a winning day for everyone. It was followed by an instructional session on Sports Psychology for senior golfers, who don't always think about the positives.

#### What's going to happen:

The interclub matches conclude with a home match with Rushcliffe on the 17th of September. The four remaining signup sheets are on the seniors notice board. Priority will be for those that have played in home games, that have submitted at least three cards for Hcp in the last 6 months, and to those that have never played in a senior's interclub match before. We have a senior's invitational on Monday 21st July. You are welcome to bring a diverse range of guests and may have points added or subtracted depending on the type of guest.

We are delighted to have three new members of our seniors' section steering group. Next year we will have match secretaries and Captains on the day to maintain service as usual. We are looking once more to establishing a seniors section roll up with simple online booking on a Monday morning to encourage mixing, social golf and a forum for new members. We will be encouraging everyone to submit more cards as playing to an accurate handicap makes for more enjoyable golf.

#### Hi, Andy Capp, again! Schrödinger's bunker rake:

This will be short and bitter! Mainly because the club declined to pay my author fee based on word count. It's like water off a camel's back to me.

What I am amazed by is that after my recent rant some personal portable ashtrays have appeared, donated by some guilty golf fairy godperson. Anyway, they are being given 'free' to smokers, at no cost so they can enjoy the fresh air while playing. When I say free, there is a massive emotional guilt trip around littering being laid on them.

I digress, Schrödinger's bunker rake, rather like Pavlov's dogs, rings a bell for all of us. Is the rake in the bunker or out of the bunker, or half in half out.

There are a variety of opinions on what should happen. Different clubs have different rules. Most rules do suggest raking bunkers and leaving them as you would like to find them. Where to leave the bunker rake varies from club to club.



At St Andrews, as with most golf courses, players are expected to rake bunkers after playing a shot, smoothing out any footprints and club marks. Rakes should be left outside the bunker, ideally away from the line of play or where they won't interfere with the movement of the ball. If a rake is left in the bunker, it's recommended to place it in a flat area, away from the edge, to avoid affecting ball movement. Green keepers prefer the 'in bunker' policy as it reduces the need to move the rake before mowing. Playing a ball from the centre of a bunker should be less challenging than elsewhere in a bunker.

Whilst opinions differ on whether rakes should be left in or out of bunkers, there are some basic mistakes we golfer should all avoid. The main one would be leaving it at right angles to the line of play. This greatly increases the chances of it affecting another player's ball. Instead, you should always try to leave it parallel to the line of play.

Another mistake to avoid is leaving it half in, half out of the bunker. No matter what the angle of the rake, if a ball comes it rest against it, the resulting lie is likely to be very difficult. Take a moment to think about whether you'd like your ball to be lodged under the lip before you leave the rake half in, half out.

As I was shaving with my branded Ockham's razor before the Saturday medal, I reflected that maybe the simplest policy is to follow the rules for the club I am playing at, and to know what they are.
