## **COUNTY WELFARE OFFICER – ROLE DESCRIPTION**

Responsible to:	BCLGA Executive Committee
Purpose of post:	Whilst everyone is responsible for safeguarding the County Welfare Officer is the person within the County with primary responsibility for managing and reporting concerns about children or adults at risk.

## Key Tasks

To be the first point of contact for volunteers, young people and parents for any issues concerning child welfare / adults at risk, poor practice and potential or alleged abuse.

To ensure that all incidents are reported correctly and referred in accordance with Policy guidelines.

To act independently and in the best interests of a child, putting the child's needs above those of others.

To ensure confidentiality is maintained and information is only shared on a 'need to know' basis.

Maintain contact details for the local children's social care department, the police and Local Safeguarding Children Board.

Be the first point of contact with the England Golf Lead Safeguarding Officer.

To advise the County Body on appropriate training for coaches and volunteers based on the England Golf recommended training requirements.

To signpost those with roles and responsibilities for children and young people to appropriate safeguarding training opportunities.

To attend committee meetings as necessary to advise on child safeguarding issues.

## The County Welfare Officer must:

Read and understand BCLGA Safeguarding Children and Young People Policy and Procedures.

Obtain an enhanced DBS and have it updated every three years.

Attend a UK Coaching Safeguarding and Protecting Children workshop and update online every three years.

Attend a NSPCC Child Protection in Sport Unit Time to Listen child safeguarding training for designated persons.

Have an awareness of the following:

- Core legislation, government guidance and national framework for safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people.
- Roles and responsibilities of statutory agencies (Children's Social Care, the Police and the NSPCC) and the Local Safeguarding Children Board.
- Equality issues, child protection and safeguarding adults at risk.
