

Jack's Corner. The weather has not exactly been ideal but hopefully we have now turned a corner and can look forwards to the preparation for the coming season. February should see us completing the work to the first green. The old drainage channels have been cleaned out and new ones added to both the green and surrounding area. Much of this work has had to be done by hand as the weather has prevented machinery being used, as a result the work has been held up. At some point before the end of the month we will need to use a temporary green for a week or so. Other areas we plan to re-turf in February are left of the 3<sup>rd</sup> green, right of the right hand bunker on the 4<sup>th</sup> and right of the 9<sup>th</sup> tee box. March sees us preparing the greens, tees, aprons and worn areas. This will mainly involve various tining, sanding, seeding and fertilising the above. Weather permitting we will be able to start cutting which instantly transforms the course giving it more definition. The course closures have been very frustrating for everyone but we will do everything in our power (and budget) to improve the problem areas before next winter.

## Winter golf



We have always played golf at Durham when it has been **frosty** but in our notifications we encourage you to take great care as conditions can be slippy. Golfers can make their own minds up as to whether or not they wish to play. It is, however, wet conditions that regularly close our course in the winter. This year has been particularly wet. We have diligently noted the worst areas and hopefully if our budget allows we can try to rectify them. Our **practice area** is one of these areas so we ask that you note and respect the signs at both entrances. Thank you.



The Badgers have made a right mess especially around the 15<sup>th</sup> green but also the 2<sup>nd</sup>,5<sup>th</sup>,14<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>. We are hoping that with increasing amounts of golfers as the season gets closer they will retreat into the woods. Until then Jack has tried diesel soaked rags tied to posts to deter them from approaching greens. If anyone has a suggestion to deter them please let us know. We think that they have migrated to our neck of the woods due to all the work further down the river.

Tree work left of 2<sup>nd</sup> tee. This work had been planned for October last year but the weather intervened. The trees are far too close together, they are fighting for light and growing too tall for their root systems. Some have already died and others have uprooted themselves. We hope that when the work is finished we will have a healthier copse that the ground staff can access with machinery in order to maintain properly. Until we can access the area with larger machinery the trunks will be left where they fall and there will also be piles of chippings around. I am assured by the contractor that these will be removed whenever conditions improve. I am also assured that the unfinished work behind the 11<sup>th</sup> green will be completed and tidied when access is possible.



**Thank you Peter.** Peter Toole has very kindly allowed us the use of his digger, when it's not being used by his company of course. This is going to be incredibly useful in helping to rectify some of the wet areas on the course. All we need now is for some drier weather to allow us to get the digger onto the course!
