ADGC Local Rules

OUT OF BOUNDS

A ball is Out of Bounds (OOB) when it is:

- In or beyond all hedges, dykes and fences which mark the boundary of the course;
- In or beyond the grip on the right-hand-side of the 1st and 13th holes;
- In or beyond the dyke on the left-hand-side of the 5th hole;
- Beyond the course-side edge of the white posts on the right-side of the 5th and 14th holes;
- On the stone bridge crossing the dyke short of the 5th green; (the concrete posts are Boundary Objects);
- Beyond the course-side edge of the white posts surrounding the maintenance area near the 5th and 7th holes;
- In or over the dyke on the right of the 11th hole; (only when playing the 11th hole);
- Beyond the white posts surrounding the clubhouse, patio, carpark, putting greens and practice facilities.

Stroke and Distance Relief MUST be taken for a ball Out of Bounds (Rule 18.2).

White posts are used to define an area of OOB (Line of sight using course side edge determines whether the ball is OOB).

White posts with a black top are used to indicate that an area of OOB is close by, which may be defined by a hedge, dyke, fence, or grip (see above) (these posts should not be used for line of sight to determine whether the ball is OOB).

White Posts (including ones with Black Tops) are Boundary Objects (No relief is available, and they must not be removed).

PENALTY AREAS

• Penalty Areas on the course are marked by either Red Stakes or Yellow Stakes. (Rule 17.1)

PRACTICE HOLES (P1 & P2)

- The 2 practice holes located to the right of the 9th hole are designated as part of the course even when they are not part of the specified round being played. A ball may be played from this area at any time.
- When the practice holes are NOT part of the specified Round, they MAY be used for practice.
- When the practice holes ARE part of the specified round, they MUST NOT be used for practice.

PUTTING GREENS

• All putting greens other than the one in use on the current hole are designated as 'Wrong Greens', including any green that has been replaced by a temporary green and any temporary green marked on the course that is not in use. (Rule 13.1f).

PROTECTION OF YOUNG TREES

• The young trees identified by a yellow band or stake anywhere on the course are no play zones. (Rule 16.1f).

ABNORMAL COURSE CONDITIONS AND INTEGRAL OBJECTS

- Ground Under Repair (GUR) is defined by any area encircled by a blue line or blue posts.
- No Play Zone is defined by any area of GUR which has white letters (NPZ) or a blue post with a white top.
- If an immovable obstruction, such as a sprinkler head, is on the **line-of-play**, within 2 club-lengths of the putting green, and also within 2 club lengths of the ball, the player may take relief under Rule 16.1b.
- At the player's option, dung from geese may be treated either, as a loose impediment or GUR.
- Roads, prepared footpaths and permanent fences on the course are to be treated as immovable obstructions.
- Tractor marks in the general area may be treated as GUR from which relief is allowed.
- If a player's ball strikes the post OR rope on a **temporary Fence** across the Fairway, the player may either: (A) play the ball as it lies, or (B) replay the stroke. (Note: this does not apply to permanent fences on the course).

SUSPENSION OF PLAY

- Suspension of Play for a dangerous situation will be signalled by one long blast from the siren. (Players must immediately stop play, mark their balls if possible, and leave the course).
- Suspension of play for any other reason will be signalled by 3 short blasts from the siren. (Players may finish the hole they are on before leaving the course OR mark their balls and then leave the course).
- Resumption of play after a suspension will be signalled by 2 short blasts from the siren repeated. (Players may return to the course and resume play).

ACCIDENTS

• Members and visitors MUST report any injury or accident before leaving the premises, including incidents where a ball is hit beyond the boundaries of the course.
