Our return to competitive action, only made possible through the efforts of our able Competition Secretary and his support team, were the envy of many clubs across the island, with combined male and female membership competing up to five days a week.

The majority of our sponsors also provided welcome support throughout the year, and hopefully an element of loyalty was displayed in return by our members in

reciprocating this support to help everyone through this together. We hope that those sponsors who were unfortunate enough to not be in a position to maintain our partnerships this year will be back on their feet and back on board in the not too distant future.

As if changes were not plentiful enough this year, we also had the introduction of the new World Handicap System. Whilst some of the new handicap indexes may have raised a few eyebrows and dissenting voices the efforts of the handicap & competition committee should not be forgotten for ensuring as smooth a transition as possible. Nor should it be forgotten that the system has been a work in progress for many years, combining the processes of no less than six handicapping authorities across the globe with one of the key principles being an aim to make the handicap system inclusive and accessible to all players, regardless of ability. Whilst our winter layout and lack of qualifying competitions until the new season have provided their own trials for this changeover, it is anticipated that the new system will quickly level itself out in the new season.

In the absence of listing names for fear of leaving someone out, commendation should go on record for the efforts of all staff and volunteers associated with the Club - Council, greens, office, catering, bar, house — without the efforts of these people our membership, who have also displayed admirable resolve and an ability to adapt throughout the season, would not have had the opportunity to do so.

Whilst the year was not without loss, the Club would like to again reiterate its condolences to the families of those who passed. In the absence of Club Notes in recent months through lack of reportable play the opportunity was not presented before now to mark the tragic passing of past captain and lifelong club man Mr Jimmy Roarty, may he rest in peace.

The AGM has also had to be postponed as the logistical issues with the intended virtual meeting are still being considered.

On the course, our Winter Cup and Phase 1 of the Thursday Club were reaching their climax and are hoped to resume if and when restrictions allow.

Any further updates regarding the potential return of our game which may arise from discussions between the Executive and our governing bodies will be circulated through internal communications and social media channels.

Whilst we look forward to getting back to the sport we love at some point in the coming months, the Club would like to wish a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all. We hope to build on the inspiration witnessed in recent adversity, plead that better fortune comes our way in 2021, and pray that all our members stay safe and well in the interim and look forward to seeing you all again soon.
